
## High Five Moment Respect & Affirmations

Each day, our staff get 'High Five Moments' when they feel like they have made a real difference. Here is a High Five Moment from Kiwi Can Co-ordinator and Leader, Cass who was teaching our respect theme of the Kiwi Can programme.



- LEARNING Accepting our uniqueness and believing INTENTION in ourselves. Recognising that respectful ways of talking and acting may change depending on where we are and who we are with.
- HOW TOTamariki stick a piece of A4 paper on eachACHIEVE THEother's back, then walk around and writeOUTCOMEon each other's paper.
  - **OBSTACLES** Often the tamariki will not know how powerful their words are and how they can stick. Tamariki will even choose to focus on negative words rather than the positive. It's a great opportunity to talk to tamariki about how words affect people and focussing on the positive is life changing.

Demonstrating the power of words, one tamariki in the class made our hearts melt. I asked if anyone wanted to share what had been written on their piece of paper. One girl said she would and read "you are amazing". She said that no one had ever said that she was amazing. I asked her how it made her feel and she said it made her feel really good about herself and her eyes started to well up, and so did mine.

# CAREER PATHWAYS

#### We need businesses to get involved with the Career Pathways Day at Flaxmere College in June.

It is an engaging and interactive event, where rangatahi explore career pathways with local businesses and institutions.

The day is targeted for years 10-13 to help them make subject, course and career decisions based on a realistic understanding of what it is like to work in different jobs. One of our main points of difference is the high levels of

interaction with employers through gamification, which incentivises students to engage in deeper discussion and discovery than traditional careers days.
